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PUPIL PREMIUM 2016/2017

Pupil Premium is an additional grant given to schools annually, based on the number of pupils registered as either Looked After or entitled to Free School Meals. It is intended that schools use this to narrow the attainment gaps of vulnerable groups of children. Below is a breakdown of how the school put the grant towards a number of projects in the financial year 2016-17.

Impact

EYFS Outcomes

In the reception class, only 30% of children were working at age-related expectations at the beginning of the year, whilst by the end, 47% achieved a good level of development.

Year 1 Phonics screening

For the past 4 years, pupils eligible for Pupil Premium have attained **above** the national average for all children.

In 2017-17, the cohort attainment figure of 83% was achieved, the highest ever for the school. This was broadly in line with the national average.

Year 6 progress and attainment

Following outstanding progress, the Y6 cohort achieved 86% (Reading), 83% (Writing), 90% (Maths) and 93% in SPaG, with a combined r/w/m score of 76%. This places the school in the top 20% nationally for progress.

In reading, the percentage of pupils eligible for Pupil Premium who reached the required standard was 90%, **19% above** the figure for all children nationally.

In writing, the percentage of pupils eligible for Pupil Premium who reached the required standard was 70% **6% below** the national average for all children.

In mathematics, the percentage of pupils eligible for Pupil Premium who reached the required standard was 80%, **5% above** the figure for all children nationally.

As a combined score, the percentage of pupils eligible for Pupil Premium who reached the required standard was 70%, **9% above** the figure for all children nationally.

Wider learning

Children across the school continue to have had access to 34 weekly clubs to broaden their wider learning experiences. None of these clubs have been chargeable and over 90% of children have accessed one or more extra-curricular activity per term as a result.

Attendance

Overall attendance for the academic year was 96.9%, which represents an improvement of 0.8% and, for the first time, places the school **above the national average**.

Impact

EYFS Outcomes

In the reception class, only 30% of children were working at age-related expectations at the beginning of the year, whilst by the end, 63% achieved a good level of development.

Year 1 Phonics screening

For the past 3 years, pupils eligible for Pupil Premium have attained **above** the national average for all children.

The percentage of children reaching the required standard was 79%, **in line with** the national average.

Year 2 progress and attainment

Following outstanding progress, the Y2 cohort achieved 72% (Reading), 62% (Writing) and 69% (Maths) with a combined r/w/m score of 58%. This cohort left EYFS with 40% GLD.

In reading, the percentage of pupils eligible for Pupil Premium who reached the required standard was 89%, **15% above** the figure for all children nationally.

In writing, whilst the percentage of pupils eligible for Pupil Premium who reached the required standard was 56% (**6% below** the national average for all children), all children who left the EYFS at an expected level achieved the national standard in Y2, **18% more** than all children nationally.

In mathematics, the percentage of pupils eligible for Pupil Premium who reached the required standard was 78%, **5% above** the figure for all children nationally.

Wider learning

Children across the school have had access to 34 weekly clubs to broaden their wider learning experiences. None of these clubs have been chargeable and over 90% of children have accessed one or more extra-curricular activity per term as a result.
